Occupational summary

This occupation is found in a veterinary practice, hospital or within welfare centres who have on-site veterinary facilities.

The size and type of the employer can vary from small independent to larger national practices, animal charities, and welfare organisations. Practices can be primary care or, referral, and provide species specific, or mixed species veterinary care.

The broad purpose of the occupation is to support with the provision of the health and welfare needs of patients and assist with veterinary treatments and procedures.

Typical tasks may include assisting and supporting with patient monitoring and providing care, preparing and maintaining the veterinary environment and relevant equipment, and liaising with external stakeholders.

Veterinary care assistants need a flexible approach and may have to work out of hours or assist with emergency care.

Their working hours can include weekends and unsociable hours due to the 24/7 nature of veterinary care.

In their daily work, an employee in this occupation interacts with all members of the veterinary team. This will include interaction with receptionists, practice managers and support staff.

They will work under the direction of registered veterinary nurses and veterinary surgeons to prioritise the health and welfare requirements of a variety of patients with diverse needs.

They may work with members of the public and external partners such as paraprofessionals, animal charities, rehabilitators and other veterinary practices.

An employee in this occupation will be responsible for assisting with veterinary care to animal patients. They may be responsible for maintaining facilities, equipment and the veterinary environment.

When undertaking their duties they will make decisions within their scope of practice and role whilst adhering to legal, ethical, and professional practice. For example, by considering current, relevant legislation such as, animal welfare, health and safety, veterinary medicines, environmental, data protection and the Veterinary Surgeons Act.

Typical job titles

Animal auxiliary nurse, Animal nursing assistant (ana), Patient care assistant (pca), Veterinary care assistant, Veterinary care support (vcs).

Knowledge

- K1:** The principles of biosecurity and infection control within the veterinary environment.
- K2:** Structure and function of all major body systems, including cells and tissues, body cavities, musculoskeletal, respiratory, circulatory, lymphatic, digestive, excretory, integument, nervous, endocrine and reproductive.
- K3:** Species-specific care and husbandry including breed characteristics and the five domains; nutrition, environment, health, behaviour and mental health.
- K4:** Normal and abnormal species-specific behaviour, in relation to health, disease, pain, life stage and nursing care.

- K10:** Species specific moving and handling techniques relevant to the situation to promote a stress-free experience.
- K11:** The organisation's policies and procedures for record keeping in line with relevant legislation.
- K12:** Legal requirements for the provision of animal first aid emergency treatment.
- K13:** The triage process for commonly occurring first aid emergencies.
- K14:** Current legislation, standard operating procedures, and workplace policies to maintain health and safety, promote own well-being, animal welfare, ethical practice and environmental protection.
- K15:** Awareness of sustainable approaches within the workplace and how individuals can contribute to reducing environmental impact.
- K16:** The scope of professional and personal limitations, roles and responsibilities within the multidisciplinary team and how to escalate concerns.
- K17:** Communication within the team and how to contribute to multidisciplinary team working. For example style, methods and modality communicating with veterinary professionals.
- K18:** Communication methods and styles for dealing with animal guardians and clients in a variety of situations, and when to refer to senior members of the team.
- K19:** Awareness of current veterinary medicines legislation and working within the dispensary area.
- K20:** Processes for end-of-life care.
- K21:** Processes for setting up, maintaining and storing commonly used veterinary practice equipment and consumables.
- K22:** Commonly used diagnostic equipment including laboratory and imaging.
